We sat down -- when I sat down at my desk, his Miranda rights was on the desk, which I looked at it, and we started talking about the rape. During this conversation, he made the comment, or he made the statement that he grabbed the victim by the left arm. I asked him to go on into further details. I asked him, "What was she

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wearing?" He said, "Blue jeans."

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He said, "She was watching television." I said, "Well, how did you get in the house?" He said through a window, but he walked down a hallway and he found her in the living room. And I said, well—I asked him, I said, "Describe the couch." He said it was tan, and that he raped her on the couch or the love seat or something to that effect. I don't remember right now whether it was the couch or the love seat or whatever.

Well, I left the office. I left the interrogation room. I was not -that case was not initially mine;
however, I did assist on it. I
went back to find Sergeant Barker.
She was in back of the police
station in another office. And I
got her, and I asked her, I said,
well --

BY MR. FOLEY: Judge, I'll object to anything -- since I think Sergeant Montgomery is getting into a conversation with someone else,
