having been previously sworn, testified as follows: 1 2 DIRECT EXAMINATION 3 BY MR. MACY: You're the same Jerry Flowers who was testifying 5 earlier who identified these tapes; is that correct? 6 Yes, I am. You've shown the jury a series of six tapes. 7 they all taken on the same day? No, sir. The first five were. The sixth one was taken the day after, which was the 24th. 10 11 All right. And when did the first one start? Approximately what time. 12 Without referring to my notes specifically, it was on 13 the 23rd about 9:30 a.m., give or take right around in there. 14 Q And then five of the tapes were made that day? 15 16 Α Correct. 17 Approximately how late did it run that evening? 18 We finished up right around 8:30 p.m., somewhere right in that area. 19 20 And then the sixth tape was made when, sir? 21 The next morning, somewhere around 9:00 o'clock, I think. Somewhere around there is when it started. 22 23 And was that the tape the jury saw last? 24 Yes, it is. 25 Q In these tapes the defendant mentioned that he at one

point wrote down some names of some, quote, "suspects,"
unquote. Do you recall what some of those names were?

A Yes, I do. He wrote down Clem Jeffries, Walter

Stephens. I believe he wrote down Thatias Robinson. I think that's -- that may be about it.

Q All right. These people that he mentioned -- now, later on he described some of these people as being ones in the tape; is that right?

A Yes.

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Q Were these people checked out as suspects in this case?

A Yes, they were.

Q And what happened to them?

A They were eliminated forensically by our forensic chemist.

Q There was from time to time when the defendant was not in his dream state, or whatever you call it, seemed to be some inconsistencies in the tapes. Would you explain that?

A Well, I personally think that the inconsistent statements were made by Mr. Miller, whereby the fact that he brought up things when he was not in his -- what I call his trance. He'd bring up things that I felt like he was just muddying the water with.

MR. EVANS: Judge, I'll object to this line of testimony and ask that it be stricken as to what his opinion

1 is in regard to a matter like this. THE COURT: Overruled. 2 He may answer. He has answered. (By Mr. Macy) All right. Now, Officer, did you go to 4 5 school at Bing? 6 No. I did not. You throughout the tapes made reference to your 7 relationship with Mr. Miller. What actually was that 8 9 relationship? Of course, my relationship with him at the time of our 10 interview was based strictly that I'm interviewing a suspect 11 that I believed could possibly be involved in a murder, and I 12 am doing everything that I have knowledge of knowing how to 13 do as to create a relationship as a good guy to him to see if I can only gather the truth in this matter. If I come on to 15 him like I'm the enemy, obviously he wouldn't talk to me. 16 But there -- all right. 17 18 The techniques you used then were used to try to obtain statements and details from him; is that correct? 19 20 That's correct. MR. MACY: Your witness, counselor. THE COURT: You may cross-examine. CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. EVANS:

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Mr. Flowers, let's go through some things that I have

some questions about. Try to do this as quickly as possible.

Now, at several times -- and the jury has just seen all the tapes. At several times on the tape Robert tries to tell you about a homicide involving a lady named Kaiser; is that right?

Yes.

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- And each time that he tried to tell you details about the Kaiser killing -- in fact, he even tells you at one point I think that Harry Carter is the man who killed Mrs. Kaiser; right?
- Yes. 11
- And in fact, that is who the police -- the Oklahoma-12 City Department thinks did kill Mrs. Kaiser, is Harry Carter; right? 14
- To my best recollection, yes. 15
- He hasn't been charged, but he's the prime suspect in 16 that lady's homicide; right? 17
 - To the best of my knowledge. I have no personal knowledge about that case.
 - Now, Robert tries to give you information about Mrs. Kaiser and her murder, who did it. You stopped him. weren't interested in that, were you?
 - That's correct. Not at that time.
- Okay. And he also tells you about a lady that was -that should have been found dead at 29th and North Shartel: 25

is that right? 1 2 Yes. 3 Now, you and the rest of the Oklahoma City Police Department looked into that; right? 4 5 Yes. 6 And in fact, you come up with no information to indicate that a lady was ever found dead or was ever killed 7 at that location; isn't that correct? 8 Yes. So, that would be a wrong piece of information that 10 Robert gave you as best we can tell; is that right? 11 12 Well, it's just not a piece of information that we could corroborate to being the truth at that time. Well, have you since -- at this time have you since learned any information to indicate that that would be true? 15 No. 16 17 There's something that struck my attention on the You told Robert that you had some witnesses to I guess 18 homicide; is that correct? You told him 19 it was the that; is that right? 21 Yes. You told him you had an eye witness that saw him 22 23 leaving Mrs. house and had in fact shown pictures -a picture lineup, one of which a picture was Robert, to this 24 witness, and this witness identified Robert's picture; is 25

that right?

2 | A Yes.

- $3 \parallel \mathbb{Q}$ And that was in fact not true.
 - A That's correct.
 - Q You were stretching the truth, shall we say, to try to once again elicit information from him; is that right? That was one of your techniques.
 - A Well, I don't know if I could say elicit information.

 All I could gather -- was trying to gather the truth at that point.
 - And when you told him that his hair had been found at both scenes, that in fact was not true either, was it?
 - A Well, all I knew at that point is Negroid hairs had been found at both scenes.
 - Q Okay. But no analysis had been done as to whether or not it was Robert's hair or even consistent with his hair; right?
 - A No, that's not correct. I had been told that Negroid hairs had been found and that the hairs taken from Mr. Miller looked similar but they had not been looked under a microscope or forensically yet. I was told that by the chemist. She wasn't positively sure that they were the right hairs, but she said that they did look very similar to the ones that she did have.
 - Q Once again, you were telling him information hoping

that he would throw his hands up and say, okay, you've got 1 me, I did it. That was pretty much your plan; is that right? Yes. As to some of the things he told you, Mr. Flowers -perhaps I missed something. Do you have any information to 5 6 tell the jury and Court that Mrs. was ever stabbed? Well, in our -- the first time we started 8 investigating this homicide, we had been told by the Medical Examiner's Office that they thought she had been stabbed several times in the vagina. At that time of the interview 10 with Mr. Miller, we thought that could be the case. We only 11 12 learned last week that that not to be the case. In fact, she has not -- she was not stabbed with a 13 sharp object in any way; is that correct? 14 No. The medical -- that's correct. Now, that's how 15 we determined -- last week we were told that it was a blunt 16 instrument that had torn the inside of her vagina. 17 Robert said several times on the tape that the woman --18 starting with Mrs. 19 , he said Mrs. was stabbed. Aside from the three-centimeter wound on her neck, do you 20 have any information now to give to the jury that indicated 21 Mrs. 22 was stabbed on any portion of her body with a knife? 23 24 No. 25 And as to Miss , aside from the blunt object

that the medical examiner thinks might have been inserted 1 into her vagina, do you have any information to give to this 2 jury and the Court right now to indicate that Mrs. 3 ever stabbed at anyplace on her body with a knife? 4 Λ No. 5 Robert told you that several times though, didn't he? That they both were stabbed or what? Λ 7 Yes. 8 Yes. 9 He says -- he tells you at one point I'm going to tell 10 you that he can see blood on Mrs. -- you were asking him 11 questions about Mrs. at the time, and on the tape he 12 said that he could see blood coming from her temple area of 13 her head. Do you recall him making that statement? 14 Vaguely I do. I can't recall part of the tape. 15 Do you have any information to give the Court or the 16 jury at this time to indicate that there were any injuries to 17 Mrs. temple area? 18 The only thing that I can recall -- you have to bear 19 in mind now, I was not at the scene of either one of these 20 two homicides. I came into this case after both homicides 21 were investigated at the scene. The only thing I can 22 remember seeing are the photographs of Mrs. and, of course, I remember seeing a lot of blood on the pillows

around her head. I can't recall actually seeing the blood

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running down her head. But there again, I was not at the scene. 3 Do you know of any information or any evidence to indicate that a cord was used to tie Mrs. 4 5 hands up? 6 The only thing that I know about that personally is the fact that she had a lot of bruising around her wrists and areas there. I do not know whether or not she was tied by a 9 cord. Obviously I wasn't there. 10 You didn't work the scene of either homicide, so you can't tell us whether or not any cord was ever found or any 11 12 cord of appliances was cut off; is that correct? That's correct. 13 14 Now, at one point Robert tells you on the tape that the jury saw, he tells you that the woman -- she's not too 15 old. She's older than Robert, middle-aged. Do you recall 16 him telling you that? 17 18 Yes, I do. 19 Now, my question, Mr. Flowers, prior to you talking to Robert, had you or anybody else from the Oklahoma City Police 20 Department shown him any pictures of the ladies that you were 21 talking about? 22 As a matter of fact, we never did have a picture 23 No. , and not -- to my knowledge not one even 24 of Mrs.

exists now.

But the crime scene photos had been taken of Mrs. 1 the ones that have been introduced into evidence, and 2 the crime scene photos of Mrs. -- excuse me -- Miss 3 had been taken; correct? 4 That's correct, 5 And you did not show him any of those pictures. Absolutely not. 7 And prior to that time, you didn't tell him or imply 8 to him in any way how old the women were that you were 9 talking about, did you? 10 No. I did not. 11 And that's when he told you that they weren't too old, 12 older than him, that they were middle-aged. 13 I recall him saying that, yes. 14 He says it several times -- Robert says it several 15 times on the tape that the man's looking for something to 16 steal, or he's looking for something to take. Now, there's 17 been other testimony on this matter before, but let me ask 18 you, Mr. Flowers: Do you know of any information as to the 19 -- first the homicide, whether anything was 20 taken? 21 Of course, you have to bear in mind again, I did not 22 work that scene. I can only tell you what I've been told, 23 that there were a few items missing from that house. Q Okay. But you heard previous testimony about her

purse was found at the scene with the money and credit cards 1 in it: correct? 2 3 Yes. Frior to the 23rd of February, 1987, when you started 4 5 the taped interview, had you or anybody else to your knowledge with the Oklahoma City Police Department ever taken 6 Robert out to any of the scenes, any of the houses and showed 7 him both their lands? 8 9 Absolutely not. You're positive of that? 10 11 As far as my personal recollection, no one ever took him out there. I know that I didn't, nor Detective Shupe 12 didn't. 13 Now, as to Mrs. 14 house, her body was discovered we found out on January the 11th, 1987. As to 15 16 Mrs. case, the yellow wire, the yellow tape that accompany a homicide or a crime scene, to your knowledge was 17 18 that placed on the house? As far as my recollection, yes, I recall seeing it in 19 a photograph. 20 And when you and Mr. Shupe took Robert out to the 21 house there on the 23rd of February, that yellow tape 22 was still on the house at that time, wasn't it? 23 I recall seeing, I think -- and I can't be absolutely 24 positive -- but I think I recall seeing one small piece on

the porch maybe wrapped around one of the poles up towards 1 the front. And, of course, I saw this after I walked up to 2 the house because it was dark. 3 You in your interviews with Robert several times placed your hands on his hands; is that correct? 5 Yes, I do. 6 Okay. Did you notice anything unusual about his 7 hands? 8 I don't know what you mean. Okay. 10 What do you mean? 11 Did you notice anything unusual about his hands? 12 As far as appearance? 13 Yes. 14 Nothing other than the fact that -- I do recall when 15 we first came in there with the forensic chemist -- and I 16 don't know if she recalls it or not -- pointing out -- of 17 course, Mr. Miller was dirty when we first brought him in. 18 recall his hair being kind of dirty and nappy looking, as 19 well as his fingernails were dirty and kind of lengthy. If 20 that's what you're getting at, I do recall that, yes. 21 His fingernails were dirty and they were lengthy.
