3 Why is he telling the police? We've all got  
4 our own theories. Keep that in mind. The theory of the  
5 State.

6 You've heard him. This is the man who is  
7 second only to Jesus Christ. Down just a little bit, not a  
8 lot. And he's a great detective, a great crime solver. He's  
9 a man that women flocked to in groves. He's got a super  
10 ego. And he wanted to show these guys, say, you guys, you  
11 don't know what you're doing, you know. And he's going to  
12 feed them these details that he thought that he was so much  
13 smarter than they were, that he could do that, that he could  
14 tell them things they didn't even know, and it really made  
15 him look like Sherlock Holmes or Matt Dillon or whoever it is  
16 he wants to be. And he started out feeding them that,  
17 feeding them little things. But what he did he matched up  
18 with these two here and they took him down. They outdid  
19 him. They out fought him. They made him keep feeding them a  
20 little more, a little bit more, a little bit more, and pretty  
21 soon he got in to where it was very clear that anybody who  
22 listened to the details of those tapes and knew the details  
23 of the crime that this is the man who went in -- all three --  
24 went in the two houses and then tried to rape even the third  
25 one.

1 for you to just disregard all the evidence in the case.  
2 That's not courage. It's not right. It's not justice.

3           Talked about what a tough case this is. Ladies  
4 and gentlemen, this is not even a 'close case when you're  
5 talking about guilt or innocence.

6           He talked about all of the inconsistencies that  
7 Robert Miller injected into those 13 hours. And he did. He  
8 threw in a lot of garbage. Let me ask you a question. The  
9 fact that he threw in a lot of garbage, does that explain how  
10 he knew all those other little details? He knew those  
11 details. He knew the intricate details. How did he know  
12 them? Now, sure, like he said, he threw in some other  
13 stuff. And if you listened carefully, these detectives never  
14 once suggested an answer to him. They might have repeated  
15 questions over and over. Never once -- they didn't suggest  
16 he leave his underwear. As I recall, well, he may have left  
17 a shoe, he may have left a glove, and then he said, no, he  
18 may have left his underwear. They didn't suggest that to  
19 him.

20           Talked about nothing being taken from either  
21 house. You've heard the testimony. We have no idea what was  
22 taken from these houses.

23           I could go through all these inconsistencies,  
24 trying to go into the windows, the stabbings and cuttings.  
25 They don't erase the fact that he knew that the killer went

1 in the back door, how he went in the back door, how he  
2 grabbed Mrs. [REDACTED] in the kitchen, how she had a picture  
3 over her bed, how he knew where the nightstand was. There's  
4 only one person that knew that. And I don't care what else  
5 he talked about, how much garbage he threw out, he knew  
6 that. There's only one way he could have known it, folks,  
7 only one way.

8           If one of his buddies had come to him and said,  
9 hey, I just raped and murdered an old lady over here, do you  
10 think the guy would have told him, yeah, and the way the  
11 house is laid out is the bed sits against this wall and  
12 there's a mirror and over next to it is a bed stand and  
13 there's a light on it and a picture on the wall? Would he  
14 give that kind of details? There's only one way that Robert  
15 Miller knows what's in [REDACTED] bedroom and that is  
16 because he was there the night he killed her.

17           He got confused between north and south.  
18 That's easy enough to do. Or when he's talking about the  
19 second lady, was he talking about Mrs. Lendvay? She lives to  
20 the north.

21           He said he hit Mrs. [REDACTED] in the head. We're  
22 talking about a guy who has assaulted and murdered two  
23 elderly women. Did he get some of the details confused? Did  
24 he hit Mrs. [REDACTED] in the head instead of Mrs. [REDACTED]? Or do  
25 we even know from those tapes for sure at times which one

1                   Mr. Evans says he got a few details right. Two  
2 or three. Are you kidding? Are you kidding? Again, without  
3 going through it -- Ray went through it. He described the  
4 details of how Mrs. [REDACTED] house was entered, where she was  
5 in the kitchen, her glasses were knocked down, her glasses  
6 were dropped here, the struggles was there. The second lady  
7 was already in the bed. He supplied detail after detail  
8 after detail after detail. And details that only but the  
9 killer could have known. He might have guessed one or two  
10 details. You don't guess the kind of detailed information  
11 that he gave us, all of which was compatible in this case.

12                   Now, he talked about the nail, this great big  
13 nail. Ladies and gentlemen, that's the great big piece of  
14 fingernail we're talking about. And when you look at it when  
15 you take it upstairs, that's all nail. That's got some of  
16 the plastic and the stuff that they put on it to examine it  
17 with. This is this great big chunk of fingernail. Okay.  
18 What is it? A quarter of an inch? I want you to look at it  
19 when you get up there. He's arrested six weeks later. Can a  
20 fingernail grow out that much in six weeks? It can grow out  
21 three times that much in six weeks.

22                   Where did it come from?

23                   I want to make one thing real clear we did from  
24 the witness stand. The guy from O.S.B.I. never sent -- he  
25 told you he never mailed us, my office a copy of his
