he's talking about? We know that Mrs. Fowler was hit in the head so hard that she had a cerebral hemorrhage.

You've heard him. This is the man who is second only to Jesus Christ. Down just a little bit, not a lot. And he's a great detective, a great crime solver. He's a man that women flocked to in groves. He's got a super And he wanted to show these guys, say, you guys, you don't know what you're doing, you know. And he's going to feed them these details that he thought that he was so much smarter than they were, that he could do that, that he could tell them things they didn't even know, and it really made him look like Sherlock Holmes or Matt Dillon or whoever it is he wants to be. And he started out feeding them that, feeding them little things. But what he did he matched up with these two here and they took him down. They outdid him. They out fought him. They made him keep feeding them a little more, a little bit more, a little bit more, and pretty soon he got in to where it was very clear that anybody who listened to the details of those tapes and knew the details of the crime that this is the man who went in -- all three -went in the two houses and then tried to rape even the third one.

for you to just disregard all the evidence in the case. That's not courage. It's not right. It's not justice.

Talked about what a tough case this is. Ladies and gentlemen, this is not even a close case when you're talking about guilt or innocence.

He talked about all of the inconsistencies that Robert Miller injected into those 13 hours. And he did. He threw in a lot of garbage. Let me ask you a question. The fact that he threw in a lot of garbage, does that explain how he knew all those other little details? He knew those details. He knew the intricate details. How did he know them? Now, sure, like he said, he threw in some other stuff. And if you listened carefully, these detectives never once suggested an answer to him. They might have repeated questions over and over. Never once — they didn't suggest he leave his underwear. As I recall, well, he may have left a shoe, he may have left a glove, and then he said, no, he may have left his underwear. They didn't suggest that to him.

Talked about nothing being taken from either house. You've heard the testimony. We have no idea what was taken from these houses.

I could go through all these inconsistencies, trying to go into the windows, the stabbings and cuttings. They don't erase the fact that he knew that the killer went

in the back door, how he went in the back door, how he grabbed Mrs. In the kitchen, how she had a picture over her bed, how he knew where the nightstand was. There's only one person that knew that. And I don't care what else he talked about, how much garbage he threw out, he knew that. There's only one way he could have known it, folks, only one way.

If one of his buddies had come to him and said, hey, I just raped and murdered an old lady over here, do you think the guy would have told him, yeah, and the way the house is laid out is the bed sits against this wall and there's a mirror and over next to it is a bed stand and there's a light on it and a picture on the wall? Would he give that kind of details? There's only one way that Robert Miller knows what's in bedroom and that is because he was there the night he killed her.

He got confused between north and south.

That's easy enough to do. Or when he's talking about the second lady, was he talking about Mrs. Lendvay? She lives to the north.

He said he hit Mrs. in the head. We're talking about a guy who has assaulted and murdered two elderly women. Did he get some of the details confused? Did he hit Mrs. in the head instead of Mrs. Or do we even know from those tapes for sure at times which one

Mr. Evans says he got a few details right. Two or three. Are you kidding? Are you kidding? Again, without going through it -- Ray went through it. He described the details of how Mrs. house was entered, where she was in the kitchen, her glasses were knocked down, her glasses were dropped here, the struggles was there. The second lady was already in the bed. He supplied detail after detail after detail after detail. And details that only but the killer could have known. He might have guessed one or two details. You don't guess the kind of detailed information that he gave us, all of which was compatible in this case.

Now, he talked about the nail, this great big nail. Ladies and gentlemen, that's the great big piece of fingernail we're talking about. And when you look at it when you take it upstairs, that's all nail. That's got some of the plastic and the stuff that they put on it to examine it with. This is this great big chunk of fingernail. Okay. What is it? A quarter of an inch? I want you to look at it when you get up there. He's arrested six weeks later. Can a fingernail grow out that much in six weeks? It can grow out three times that much in six weeks.
